RE-ESTABLISHING ENGLAND/AUSTRALIA AIR SERVICES 1945 — 1954

Before the end of the war Qantas managing director, Hudson Fysh, was concerned about obtaining suitable aircraft and re-establishing the Sydney/London air route and the former business relationship between BOAC and QEA.

Britain, concentrating on manufacturing bomber and fighter aircraft during the war, had fallen behind the USA in producing commercial aircraft. The big question for Fysh was should he use outdated British aircraft or the advanced US aircraft designs.

There was political pressure to use British aircraft and when the service first began QEA used Lancastrian and Hythe aircraft as a stop gap measure. (Book 4 - Part 1, Chapter 6.)

Finally QEA purchased the US designed Constellation.

This chapter, and Chapter 6, details the development of the London/Sydney service and other minor routes in the Pacific during the period when QEA gradually increased its operations as the war ended.

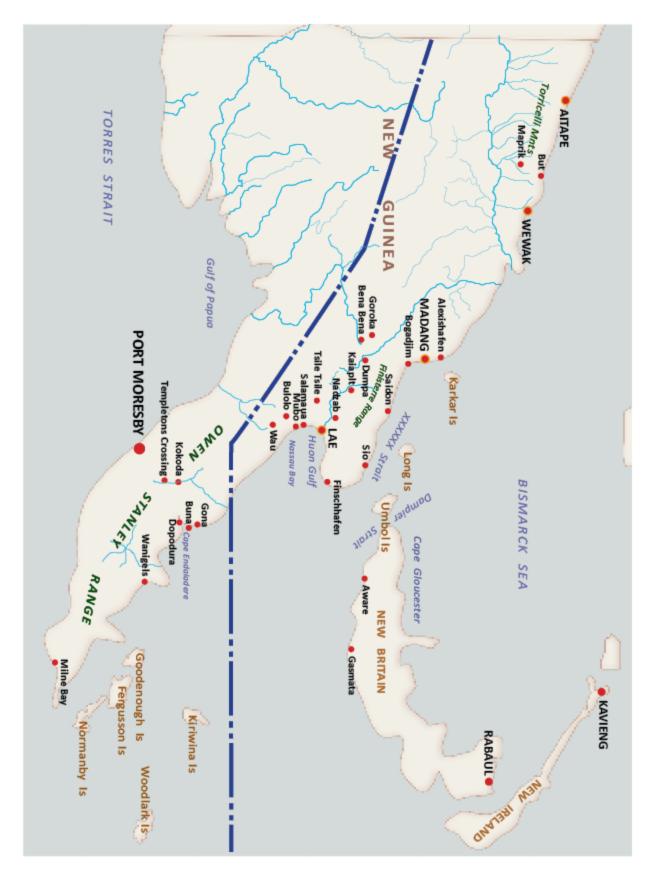


FIGURE 525: Map showing locations referred to in the text.
